Things you can do in your community...

1. Women: Visit a local strip club. Take them a treat (like cupcakes, brownies, cosmetics, etc) and give the dancers a copy of "Somebody's Daughter" and invite them to church or a woman's small group; offer to pray with them or meet with them one on one.
2. Visit a local adult book store. Take them a treat (like cupcakes, brownies, cosmetics, etc) and give the employees (or owner) a copy of "Somebody's Daughter" and invite them to church or a small group; offer to pray with them or meet with them one on one.
3. Purchase "She's Somebody's Daughter" billboards within sight of local strip clubs, massage parlors, adult book stores, etc.
4. Meet with the Mayor or city council people re: enforcing and/or upgrading local obscenity laws. Petition if necessary.
5. Host a local event celebrating the achievements of young women in the community.
6. Host a Pornography Abuse Awareness event at your local YMCA, Christian High School, or Christian college. Make sure schools include pornography abuse awareness and prevention in their student orientation.
7. Boycott businesses that offer pornography for sale. If they are subsidiaries, make sure to talk to the parent company. Call, write, *and* e-mail.
8. Malls now routinely resort to soft-core pornography in their window displays and advertising. Make it clear to store managers that you will take your business elsewhere until the environment is appropriate for children. Then stand by your word.
9. Tell your local supermarket to put inappropriate materials out of reach and sight of children or you will take your business elsewhere. Mean it.
10. Call TV stations that air objectionable ads or programming.
11. Hold a community wide event to draw attention to this issue. Knock on doors. Involve local radio and television stations, newspapers, retailers, business leaders, clergy, educators, and private citizens. Hold a rally and a concert that will generate public awareness.
12. Write state senators, congressman, and the US attorney general about enforcing obscenity laws and prosecuting offenders.
13. Work to strengthen obscenity laws in your own community.
14. Women: Volunteer with an organization helping people exit the sex industry.
15. Speak to friends, relatives, and co-workers about this issue.
15. Commit to financially supporting an organization helping people overcome pornography.
16. Challenge the use of terms like "gentleman's" club and "adult" book store – terms that normalize pornography in our culture.
17. Organize or participate in White Ribbon against Pornography Week activities. In particular, work to have your community pass the White Ribbon against Pornography proclamation.
18. Respond on Facebook or Twitter when popular recording artists or actors cross the line of decency and good taste in their media or live event appearances.
19. Take note of the offensive stories and gratuitous images offered on "news" sites. Let the webmaster know what you found.
20. Conduct a community prayer walk in areas of your community where sexually oriented businesses exist.
